Yet gradually my one-task mission begins to fade into the back of my mind as I begin to wander up and down the eighteen aisles gazing wide-eyed at the seemingly limitless selection of nourishment, nutrition, subsistence, and sustenance. Oh wow, did you know they still made these? Whoa, this is a new flavor! Huh, what's the difference between trans fat and saturated fat? We should make homemade pesto. What are all the marshmallow shapes in Lucky Charms, again? Heart, stars, horseshoes, clovers... Is that a good deal on NY strip steak? Are these avocados ripe? Oreos! Then suddenly my phone starts buzzing in my pocket. It's my wife. I pick up and she asks, Honey, where are you? It's been forty-five minutes! Did you remember to pick up the mozzarella cheese?

I'm sure I'm not the only husband this has happened to, but as humans, we all have a tendency to forget "why we are here." Fortunately, the consequences in the grocery store are easily mitigated. Paul was similarly sent on a one-thing assignment as an apostle of Christ. In Corinth, there were many distractions, diversions, and dissensions. In a church consumed with controversies regarding baptisms, who's whos, flashy signs, and lofty speech - Paul kept the main thing the plain thing.

For I decided to know nothing among you except Jesus Christ and him crucified.

1ST CORINTHIANS 2:2

May his gospel be the great emphasis, priority, and center of all that we are as PA Bible. If someone walks in our doors at 700 Market Street let them see and hear one thing - Jesus Christ and him crucified.

Him we proclaim, warning everyone and teaching everyone with all wisdom, that we may present everyone mature in Christ.

COLOSSIANS 1:28

As Christians, we believe and we proclaim a living person! Paul wrote, "him we proclaim." We don't proclaim a formula, or a Bible teacher, or a series of Bible teachings, or our church, but the Savior. We make much of his person, his work, and his lordship. Note here Paul says "everyone" three times. Warning *everyone*. Teaching *everyone*. So that *everyone* may be presented as mature in Christ.

All our fellowship is in the gospel. All our faith is in the gospel. All our hope is in the gospel. At PA Bible, Jesus Christ is our message, our aim, our affection, and our Lord. So don't miss the forest for the trees. Don't forget the "mozzarella cheese."
