Mercies and Comfort

The Corinthian Order of Events – and the Four Letters to Them

- 51 AD Paul's first visit to Corinth (Acts 18:1-21)
 - He proclaims the gospel and the Corinthian church is planted.
 - Here, he also meets Aquilla and Priscilla. He works and stays with them.
 - Paul remained with this young church for 18 months before proceeding to Ephesus to preach the gospel there.
- 52 53 AD Apollos visited the church in Corinth, and it seems likely that Peter also did.
 - Unfortunately, the Corinthians became divisive over which church leaders they felt that they were individually "of."
 - Sexual sins were also rampant among them, and so Paul wrote them a noncanonical letter about it.
 - We don't have this <u>first letter</u>, but he reminds them about what he wrote in this first letter in **1 Cor 5:9** and elaborates even further on it.
 - o The Corinthians write a letter back to Paul with specific doctrinal questions for him.
- 54 AD From Ephesus, Paul writes 1st Corinthians, his second letter to them (1 Cor 16:8)
 - He sends Timothy to visit them. (1 Co 16:10 11)
 - Timothy returns but doesn't have a good report back to Paul about how they received him and 1st Corinthians.
- **54 AD** Paul makes an immediate second visit to discipline Corinth and is heartbroken by what he finds (**2 Cor 2:1**; **10:10**; **11:4-8**, **13-15**; **13:2**).
 - Jewish "super-apostles" had embedded themselves into the church leadership and had rejected Paul's apostleship.
 - o The divisions and personal attacks on Paul's credibility had only increased.
- **54 AD** Paul writes another non-canonical letter to them. This one was "severe" and written out of "much affliction and anguish" for them with "many tears." (**2 Cor 2:4; 7:8**)
 - o This is his third letter to them, and he sends it with Titus to Corinth.
- 55 AD After hearing back from Titus about their sorrow and repentance (2 Cor 2:13; 7:5; Acts 20:1), Paul writes 2 Corinthians to them.
 - o This is his fourth letter to them.
- 56 AD Paul's third visit to Corinth, spending the three winter months with them. (Acts 20:2)
 - o During this time, he wrote Romans and then left for Jerusalem.

Paul Was Willing, But Didn't Want to Have to Make a Painful Visit to Them

1st Corinthians 4:14 - 21

- **14** I do not write these things to make you ashamed, but to <u>admonish you as my beloved</u> children.
- **15** For though you have countless guides in Christ, <u>you do not have many fathers</u>. For <u>I</u> became your father in Christ Jesus through the gospel.
- 16 I urge you, then, be imitators of me.
- **17** That is why I sent you Timothy, my beloved and faithful child in the Lord, to remind you of my ways in Christ, as I teach them everywhere in every church.
- **18** Some are arrogant, as though I were not coming to you.
- **19** But I will come to you soon, if the Lord wills, and I will find out not the talk of these arrogant people but their power.
- 20 For the kingdom of God does not consist in talk but in power.
- **21** What do you wish? Shall I come to you with a rod, or with love in a spirit of gentleness?



Mercies and Comfort

A Large Theme of Comfort in 2nd Corinthians

- In the letter as a whole, the *paraklēsis* word group ("comfort," "consolation," "appeal") is a dominant theme in the letter.
 - o 29 of 59 instances of these words in the New Testament are found in this epistle.
- The idea behind this word group in the New Testament is always more than calming care or soothing sympathy.
 - It has the idea of strengthening, coming alongside helping, and making another stronger to endure.
 - The Greek idea behind this is communicated by the equivalent Latin word for comfort (fortis), which also means "brave."

<u>Paul's Concern Is Not for His Reputation Remaining Intact in Corinth, But</u> <u>For the Gospel</u>

2nd Corinthians 11:2 – 5

- **2** For I feel a divine jealousy for you, since I betrothed you to one husband, to present you as a pure virgin to Christ.
- **3** But I am afraid that as the serpent deceived Eve by his cunning, your thoughts will be led astray from a sincere and pure devotion to Christ.
- **4** For if someone comes and proclaims <u>another Jesus</u> than the one we proclaimed, or if you receive <u>a different spirit</u> from the one you received, or if you accept <u>a different gospel</u> from the one you accepted, you put up with it readily enough.
- **5** Indeed, I consider that I am not in the least inferior to these super-apostles.

Salvation Is Free, But Discipleship Is Going to Cost You Everything

Matthew 16:24 Then Jesus told his disciples, "If anyone would come after me, let him <u>deny</u> <u>himself</u> and <u>take up his cross</u> and follow me.

1st Peter 4:12 - 13

12 Beloved, do not be surprised at the fiery trial when it comes upon you to test you, as though something strange were happening to you.

13 But rejoice insofar as you <u>share Christ's sufferings</u>, that you may also rejoice and be glad when his glory is revealed.

2nd Timothy 3:12 Indeed, all who desire to live a godly life in Christ Jesus will be persecuted

Romans 8:18 For I consider that <u>the sufferings of this present time</u> are not worth comparing with the glory that is to be revealed to us.

Suffering as Proof of Christian Authenticity

Luke 6:26 "Woe to you, when all people speak well of you, for so their fathers did to the false prophets.

Galatians 6:17 From now on let no one cause me trouble, for <u>I bear on my body the marks</u> of Jesus.
